Descendants of Joseph Smith Sr. Schedule A Reunion in Kirtland

The fourth biennial reunion of the descendants of Joseph Smith Sr. and Lucy Mack Smith, Parents of Joseph Smith Jr., who founded the LDS Church, will be held Aug. 4-7 in Kirtland, Ohio.

Advance registrations indicate that hundreds of family members, from across the nation, are planning to attend.

It has been estimated that the progeny of Joseph Smith Sr. and Lucy Mack Smith number more than 12,000. Descendants today trace their geneology through one of seven of the 11 Smith children; Hyrum (1800-1844), Joseph Jr. (1805-1844), Samuel Harrison (1808-1844), William (1811-1893), Katherine (1813-1900), Don Carlos (1816-1841), and or Lucy (1821-1882).

The first reunion of members of the family in over 126 years took place in historic Nauvoo, Ill, during August of 1972. It was decided at that time to continue to meet on a biennial basis. Subsequent reunions were held in Independence, MO, in 1973 and Salt Lake City, in 1975.

Goals for the family reunions have been, in part, to compile a complete record of the family, to cultivate the type of relationships and interests necessary to have a successful family organization, and to maintain all family ties and associations. In seeking to achieve these goals, discussions have been confined to family matters while religious and doctrinal matters have been excluded.

The Joseph Smith Sr. family reunion committee, presided over by Buddy Youngreen, executive-secretary, is the agency responsible for the planning,

execution and financing of all reunions. Committee members represent descendant family organizations and geographic areas. Hyrum Smith descendant committee members include Eldred G. Smith, Joseph F. Patrick and Ralph G. Smith. Joseph Smith Jr. descendant committee members are Lynn E. Smith, Lorene Smith and Gracia Denning. Samuel Harrison Smith descendant committee members include Melvin T. Smith, Joseph Byron Smith and Allen L. Smith. Katherine Smith Salisbury descendant committee members consist of Dorothy Dean, Kenneth E. Duke and Warren L. Van Dine.

Buddy Youngreen has been sustained as executivesecretary by acclamation of the family at the reunions. He presides over the reunion committee and coordinates all reunion functions. Additionally he serves as co-chairman of the individual biennial reunions, sharing duties with alternating chairmen of the hosting, program and arrangements committee.

Acting under the auspices of the reunion committee, Lynn E. and Lorene Smith will co-chairman the 1977 Kirtland reunion hosting, program and arrangements committee. 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JOSEPH SMITH SR. DESCENDANTS WITNESS STIRRING PERFORMANCE AT KIRTLAND FAMILY REUNION

A one-hour characterization of Joseph Smith Jr., prophet-founder of the LDS Church, was performed by S. Bryce Chamberlain, Brigham Young University actor and faculty member, at the Joseph Smith Sr. family reunion in Kirtland, Ohio, last week. Many Southern California descendants of the Senior Smith were in attendance.

Mr. Chamberlain, who has appeared on the stage in California and Utah and in BYU films, begins his solo performance of "Joseph the Prophet" with a description of Joseph Smith's physical bearing and appearance as he applies theatrical makeup to his own face. Background continues with comments about Joseph extracted from diaries, writings, and records of those who knew him intimately.

Various explanations of the effect and purpose of the makeup are interjected as Chamberlain's appearance is slowly altered. Last minute clothing changes and a new dimension to the voice combine with a shift in narration from third person to first person as the actor is suddenly transformed into the character of Joseph.

From this point Joseph speaks to the audience in conversations with imaginary persons. He displays personal feelings of humor, sorrow, love, despair, and joy. Insights into the relationships with his family and friends are shared, and Joseph reminisces about his boyhood, ancestry, and first vision. And he expounds on new doctrines, grieves over hetrayals, places authority in the Twelve, and sees that his time has come.

The actor also uses some multi-

media projections to provide scenic backgrounds for his presentation.
