

Storms were raging all around the Salt Lake Valley with rain pouring down, but around the immediate downtown area of Salt Lake, it was bright, sunny, and wonderful.

Friday, August 3, registration at Joseph Smith Memorial Building began by 8:00 a.m. This was a little tricky, but somehow, it all worked out.

Both the Primary age children and the youth met in suites A, B, C, D up on the 10th floor of the Joseph Smith Memorial Building. This was very nice for the family.

The program began with the opening hymn of *Love At Home*. After Sam Isom offered the prayer, Steve conducted and made a few announcements. Steve used his humor. He included some jokes about what happens when you play some of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir records backward — you hear secret Jell-O recipes. He reminded everyone that we are a not-for-profit group about a prophet. It was explained that the goal of the reunion fees was to break even or have a little left to use in planning the next reunion. Steve then introduced President Fred Larsen of the Remnant Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and the following speaker, Charles Olsen.

Fred gave an overview of his church's history. He shared Joseph Smith's experience and then compared his knowledge and perception. It was good for the family to understand and appreciate this church.

Charles Olsen gave a report about the last family reunion. He told events from the reunion tour in 2005. Many miracles were shared with the group. Excitement built within the family as they realized the importance and power of getting together.

The family took a small break after that.

As the group gathered again, Steve and I began a roll call for the large group. The Joseph Smith Sr. Family came from 15 states and two Canadian provinces. The family stood when their state or province was called. A roll call was performed for each family line as well.

Then we had everyone stand from the Joseph and Lucy Mack Smith's children's lines they came through. This year we had family from William's, Katherine's, Samuel's, Hyrum's, and Joseph's lines. The only line with posterity not represented was Lucy's family.

Eldred and Hortense Smith showed the family artifacts. It was fascinating to hear the stories they presented as they held up items belonging to the Smiths. This may have been the last time they were able to show these to the family now that Eldred was 100 ½. The children came down after their activities and had the opportunity of viewing these items.

Everyone had a chance to come down to the front and look at the clothes Hyrum was wearing when he was shot and killed. The spirit and appreciation the family felt witnessing these items up close were evident.

Friday, August 3, Primary Activities

Julie Maddox and many of her family planned and took charge of the Primary Activities. The Primary kids were able to use wood and elastic guns made by Julie's father, Carlos Adams, to kill gummy bears for food. The children also participated in stick-pulling games and activities from that era.

Friday, August 3, Youth Activities

The youth had their own speaker on Friday. Scott Anderson spoke in a way that helped the youth see how important they are. He compared the Smiths, especially the brothers' loyalty, to football and life today. Everyone was captivated.

Joy Ercanbrack's notes from the Friday morning youth speaker:

Scott Anderson began the youth session by sharing his testimony and enthusiasm for the Smith Family. He challenged the youth with this question: Can we learn what the Smiths knew about being a close family? Following are other



great thoughts that he cleverly mixed with the Smith family story.

Learning about your family history helps you find yourself.

The Smith brothers were physically strong and very tall for their time: Alvin was 6'4", Hyrum 6'3", and Joseph 6'2". You can imagine how the crowds on the street parted when they came to town! The brothers shared an amazing bond—they admired the strengths of one another and deeply cared for and respected the women in their family. The Smith men knew there was more to manhood than just muscle. The first thing about being a man is showing deep respect for women.

Don't let fear chase you away from things that matter to you. Remember Joseph in the sacred grove when Satan tried to prevent him from praying? Face your fears with courage like your Uncle Joseph.

Sometimes you'll wonder how you measure up before the Lord. Joseph asked this same question at age seventeen. His prayer prompted the first visit of Moroni. The Smith family is forgiving and caring. After he had been dragged from bed, Joseph's Sunday sermon was about love after he had been dragged from bed, then tarred and feathered.

Don't ever listen to anyone who would speak negatively of your Aunt Emma. Do not believe it. Emma's strength and commitment to Joseph, the Smith family, and the gospel were proven many times. She was a beautiful, courageous, and a compassionate lady who loved her family and loved the Lord.

Hyrum is the one person Joseph never had to reprove ever. They are an example of what it means to be united in brotherhood.

Somehow your time here at the reunion is more about you than about your past! Remember the qualities that are inherent in your family. Live with courage, commitment, strength, ability to face fear, unity, and love.

Joy also included notes from other activities. Joy baked Emma Smith's cookie recipe and served them to the youth. The youth group discussed what makes a good recipe for a family reunion.

These are some of the youth's recipes for a happy family or great reunion. The youth decorated each recipe poster, and their creativity with the ingredients and directions is evident. It was impressive how the youth included the ideas of everyone in their group. Can you guess which recipe had all boys in the "kitchen?"

When the movie ended, the family was required to walk together, following Richard Lenz to the Tabernacle. The group was seated down front in the Tabernacle for the organ recital. The family traveled together and attended the concert to maintain security, use the choir seats, and be finished in time for the next organ concert. The group was amiable with this idea.


