Karl Anderson's notes on the significance of John Johnson Farm:

- Home of Joseph Smith from September 1831 to September 1832.
- Church leadership conference site (about eight conducted here).
- Mob of about 50 men tarred and feathered Joseph Smith and Sidney Rigdon.
- Joseph Murdock Smith died and was perhaps buried here in 1832 at age eleven months.
- Joseph Smith's Translation of the Bible was worked on here.
- Vision of Father and Son and eternal worlds. (D&C 76)

- Home of the prominent John and Alice Johnson family. Children Luke and Lyman became members of the Quorum of the Twelve.
- Their daughter Marinda Nancy married Orson Hyde, another member of the Twelve.
- Decision to print the revelations (Book of Commandments, forerunner of the Doctrine and Covenants) to the Church was made here.
- Sixteen Revelations received. D&C sections 1, 65, 66, 67, 68, 69, 71, 73, 74, 76, 77 (no CofC), 79 (78), 80 (79), 81 (80), 99 (96), 133 (108).

While the markers were being glued together and placed at each campsite location, some of the family helped plant the Smith Family lilacs under the direction of Gilda Sundeen. Lilac bushes have been a meaningful plant for the Smith Family: Lucy Mack Smith, Emma Smith, Jerusha Barden Smith, Mary Fielding Smith, among others. The lilacs

planted here are those nurtured by Smith Family descendants for many decades, brought from the Smith Family cemetery in Nauvoo, Illinois; and "This is the Place Monument," in Salt Lake City, Utah. These lilacs were planted as part of the 2011 Joseph Smith Sr. and Lucy Mack Smith Family Reunion to honor the family members who have gone before.

Karl Anderson explained:

"Church life in Kirtland revolved around the Newel K. Whitney and Company store from 1831-1834. Whitney, a successful merchant and postmaster, began operation of his first store in Kirtland about seven years before the Church moved to Kirtland. A few years later, his partner in the mercantile business, A. Sidney Gilbert, moved to Missouri in 1831.

The LDS Church restored this store and furnished it as when it operated in 1831."

Karl told about the significance of this area by pointing out:

- Church meeting and administration headquarters.
- First Presidency of the Church organized here.
- Appearance of the Father and Son.
- School of the Prophets first held here 1832-1833.
- Joseph Smith's Translation of the Bible was "completed" here in 1833.
- United Order included the Whitney store. The store served as the Bishops Storehouse.
- Joseph Smith's residence 1832-1834.
- Joseph Smith III born here in NW upstairs bedroom, Nov. 6, 1832.
- Revelations received: D&C 78 (77), 84 (83), 85 (no Cof C), 86, (84), 87 (no Cof C), 88 (85), 89 (86), 90 (87), 91 (88), 92 (89), 93 (90), 94

Saturday night the family gathered at the Mayfield Church Building for a banquet and program. The meal was wonderful and the company grand.
